Class assemblies

Year 2

Read Every Day

We've been doing a lot of work on reading for pleasure, developing reading stamina and increasing reading diversity.

The more reading children do, the more quickly they will develop as readers, so it's important that children get into good daily reading routines.

'I like reading because it's fun and gives you something to do.' Zac Year 4

'Reading gives you a great imagination.' Luke Year 4

I like reading because it gives me a good imagination and inspires me.' Nia Year 3.

'Reading is magical because when you're reading, it's like you're going to magical places.' Rasharn Year 5

The strategy of '**pause**, **prompt**, **praise**' is helpful when listening to children read: pausing to let them work out words if they get stuck, providing a prompt or 'clue' to help (but not giving the answer), and praising them when they concentrate and problem-solve.

We are in the process of implementing a new reading programme called Destination Reader in KS2. We've had some training from consultants from Hackney Education and we're already starting to notice children using the learning behaviours in their lessons.

Here are some Destination Reader learning behaviour stems that you could try at home with your child during or after reading.

Support

That's a good way to think about it

Would you like to offer an opinion?

Active listening

Can you explain further?

Tell me more...

Year two's assembly was based on the story 'Lost and Found by Oliver Jeffers. The story is about the friendship between a boy and a penguin. The story begins when the penguin turns up at the boy's house.

The boy presumes that he is lost and sets off on a quest to help the penguin get home. The boy reads that penguins are from the South Pole and so together they set out across the sea through challenging bad weather. Before the story ends, the boy discovers that friendship is the most valuable find of all.

The children performed their own versions of the story. They also shared interesting facts about penguins and penguin habitats they had researched. They ended the assembly with a song about penguins.

Well done to the teachers and children for a wonderful assembly.

Reception class

Reception class' assembly was based on a Unicorn Theatre production of a storybook called 'Wild', written by Emily Hughes.

The children have been engaging in drama and art activities that explored key themes, ideas and characters from the story.

Their excellent performance told the story of Wild, a young girl who lives in the woods with the animals who teach her everything she needs to survive. She loves her life and is happy in the embrace of nature.

However, when a psychiatrist (doctor) finds her, captures her and takes her home, things go terribly wrong. The psychiatrist assumes that because Wild is human, she wants to live like he does: wear clothes, eat with a knife and fork and learn how to speak. He does everything he can to change her, but his efforts are futile.

The message at the heart of the story is that people are different and need and want different things. It is about seeing things from someone else's perspective and accepting people for who they are rather than trying to change them into something they are not.



Games Night

Punctuality

Every Day Counts and being on time means not missing out

A reminder that the school gates open at 8.50am and all children should be in the playground ready for the morning exercise. Parents/carers are responsible for ensuring their children arrive at school on time.

Coming to school on time every day helps your child to be ready for learning and not miss learning opportunities.

If your child arrives late for class:

They miss out on important learning, which could affect their achievement.

They don't have the social time to settle into class.

It can be embarrassing for them.

They may disrupt the learning of the rest of the class.

What you can do?

Have a regular routine for the start of each day.

Help your child get their clothes and equipment ready before they go to bed.

Set a reasonable bed time to make sure they get enough sleep.

NEWS FROM YEARS 1-6

Here is some news about this term from classes 1-6. Ms Angie has sent an Early Years newsletter separately with lots of information about Nursery and Reception.

<u>Year 1</u>



In **Literacy** this term, we have focused on learning about Fiction and Non-Fiction writing. We looked at books that had facts and information, headings, captions and real photographs. We used this to help us write our own reports about caterpillars and butterflies. This was inspired by our core text, 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. We also wrote our own stories using this text and focused on including adjectives and expanded noun phrases in our work. We have also worked hard to improve our story writing and remembering to use capital letters, finger spaces and full stops.



In **Mathematics** this term, we have been learning about multiplication, division and fractions. We were able to recognise the multiply and divide symbols in number sentences and then we even

started on word problems. We had to read the questions and work out what it was asking us to do. We learnt to multiply by grouping and divide by sharing. It was tricky at first, but we got there in the end. We have also looked at fractions and understood the roles of the numerator and the denominator. We were able to find half of a shape and a quarter of a shape. We even made sandwiches and cut them in halves and quarters to help us with our learning. It was yummy!





In **Science** this term, we have been learning about Plants. We first identified what a plant is the different features of a plant and their functions. We looked at garden plants, wild plants, and their differences. Then we made observations of growing plants by planting some of our

own and watching how they change over time. This was fun as we were able to do our own investigation. We also looked at the differences between plants and trees. We learnt the features and function of both and then compared them. We now know that roots anchor a plant and help it to absorb water and nutrients.



In **Reading**, we have been using Bug Club to help with our reading during phonics. We also read

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every day first thing in the morning and have Story time at the end of the day where our teachers read aloud to us. We love listening to stories. We have really been focusing on reading alien words as our Phonics Screening Test is taking place week beginning 12th June. The teachers in year 1 are sending home phonics words every day. Please help us to read at home so that we can do well our very best!



This term we celebrated the coronation of King Charles III. We had a tea party in school and dressed up in our best clothes. Thank you to the parents of Holmleigh who provided lots of yummy treats for us to enjoy!





<u>Year 2</u>

This half term, Year 2 have been focussed on preparing for the end of Key Stage 1 SATs tests. There were 4 tests: two reading papers and two Maths papers. The reading paper test the children's reading comprehension. The maths papers mental maths and problem solving skills. The children took their tests in small groups and had the whole of May to complete them. The children worked really hard to learn the skills needed to complete the tests. Well done to all the children in Year 2 for their hard work and determination to do well.

We have also started learning about Quest stories this half term. We have read the book 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers and wrote our own fantastic versions of the story. In fact, one retelling of the story, written by Tise, was the basis for the Year 2 assembly on 18th May 2023. The children learned facts about penguins and the North Pole and learned how to perform a funny song about penguins.

The Science topic for this half term was 'Growing Plants'. We planted vegetable seeds that germinated in the school greenhouse. The seedlings were then planted in a plant box in the school garden. When the vegetables are fully grown, we will enjoy the 'fruits' of our labour by sampling our home-grown vegetables. At the start of the next half of the summer term, we will visit Kew Gardens to see the amazing plants and flowers that are grown there. We are looking forward to our class trip.







Year 3

This term in Year 3 we have been learning how to write newspaper reports. We've been looking at lots of newspapers and identifying all the features. We then wrote our own newspaper reports based on the Iron Man, 'The Monstrous Metal Giant!'.

In Maths, we have been learning about measuring length and perimeter. We had a go at measuring lots of objects around the classroom and the school using rulers, measuring tape and meter sticks! We then learnt how to calculate the perimeter of a shape.

In Geography our topic has been 'Weather around the world', where we have been looking at the climates in different parts of the world. We each got to choose a country and did some research on the weather and climate of our chosen country. We even got to act as travel agents to find people suitable holidays!

In Science we have been learning about plants. Some of the things we have been learning about include; the life cycle of a flowering plant, types of seed dispersal and photosynthesis. We also really enjoyed our recent trip to the Science Museum where we got to visit the Wonderlab exhibition. We had a fantastic time having a go at testing out Science









Year 4

This half term Year 4 have enjoyed an exciting trip to Kidzania where we experienced lots of different careers and activities which included: delivering parcels, flying a plane (BA simulator), floristry, becoming a DJ and becoming a vet. The children earnt KIdzos which they were able to use to pay for activities and they even got to purchase something from the shop.

In Maths we have been looking at multiplication and division (mental and written methods), solving problems and understanding fractions. It is getting close to the National MTC test so we are also practising are times tables.

In Literacy we have learnt about newspapers and news articles. The children have written some fantastic articles about the King's coronation and we have turned fairy tales into news stories. We have also imagined what would be in an article if aliens invaded Holmleigh Primary School.

In Science we have learnt about sound and how we hear. We have thought about how sound travels, which animal has the best hearing (a moth) and how we can muffle sound.

In Geography we have looked at the physical geography of North and South America and the UK with a focus on the UK's rivers and mountains.

In RE we have learnt about Christianity with Miss Siddiqui and in Art we have completed some amazing mosaics.









Year 5

In Science we have been learning about Earth and Space. Did you know that over 70% of the Earth's surface is water? Over 7 billion people live on Earth and there are 195 countries.



How many countries can you name? Do you know their capital cities?

In Maths we have been learning about ratio and proportion. Ratio and proportion is an area in Maths which deals with the relationship between two or more quantities. In Year 2 there are 18 boys and 12 girls. The ratio of boys to girls is 18:12

This term in Literacy our work has been based around a book by Berlie Doherty called Street Child. Set in the second half of the nineteenth century, Street child tells the story of a boy called Jim who, after a series of misfortunes, spends time in the workhouse as a child labourer and lives on the streets. The book is based on the true story of an orphan whose plight inspired Doctor Barnardo to try to help street children, and led to the founding of his children's homes.



Exploring the novel enabled the children to discuss challenging themes including cruelty, injustice, resilience and humanity. It also enabled the children to develop an understanding of issues such as poverty and child labour.



In PE we played rounders and dodgeball which we really enjoyed.

In ICT we worked on writing our own Blogs. We did some research on blogs and then wrote our own based on a topic of our choice. We presented our blogs to the rest of the class.

We also had after school booster sessions on Wednesdays and Thursdays with Ms Ercan, Ms Karen, Mr Richard and Ms Boateng


My favourite test was the SPAG test because the questions were mainly multiple choice.


After the last test on Friday, we went to Springboard Park for a picnic.
