In science we have continued learning about forces and have focused on mechanisms exploring pulleys, levers and gears. We have thought how they are used in the real world and how they work.



In mathematics we have learnt how to add and subtract mentally using a range of strategies and have then moved on to estimating and then calculating larger, trickier sums using the column method. We have worked with numbers up to six digits and have also worked with decimal numbers.
