

praise for that alone, regardless of results. Parents and carers also deserve our gratitude for helping to ensure the children were well-prepared. We will be keeping everything




crossed ahead of the results being released in July as





In Maths, the class learned about statistics, shape, geometry and a little

algebra, which we will delve into further in the next half term. The amount of lessons on this subject increased in preparation for the SATs and will now be reduced, but we will ensure they maintain the skills they've picked up in preparation for SATs and are fully-prepared for the challenges that lay ahead in secondary school.



In **Literacy**, Team 6 will continue to hone their punctuation and grammar skills to help them to write independently across a range of genres and structures as they strive to reach the expected standard, or greater depth, in time for the 22nd June deadline. There may be some boosters required to get some children over the line if they still require a few more TAFs than are likely to be achieved in the few weeks we have left in normal working days. Some of this writing will build on our class book in Reading, The

Final Year by Matt Goodfellow, which tells the tales of Nate (a Year 6 pupil based in Manchester) as he finishes his primary education and overcomes some serious struggles both at home and school.
